Effective early childhood teachers carefully observe children throughout the day to understand children's perspectives, interpret their development, plan curriculum, and document learning. This course builds on knowledge of child development through the study of naturalistic observation, authentic assessment, screening, formal evaluation, and documentation of learning. Students will use a variety of informal observation methods. Student will demonstrate and practice observational data collecting to analyze a child's developmental behaviors using an assessment tool to scaffold for development and learning.
