- COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course is an introduction to Spanish language and culture within the context of daily Β. life in Spanish-speaking regions worldwide. Communication skills include speaking, listening, reading and writing. Sensitivity to cultural differences is emphasized. Designed for the student with NO previous foreign language study.
